






# **Laurel Garden Club**

In a Challenge design, all participants are given identical components—a container, mechanics for anchoring the material, flowers, and greenery—and the instructor provides general guidelines. During the excellent program, Arlene shared tips on conditioning and preparing the flowers for arranging, how to use floral wire as the stabilizer for the flowers, and hints on arranging. Following the instructions, members were given 30 minutes to create a design of their choosing, after which the designs were critiqued and judged.

The variegated green vases, found at Crate and Barrel outlets, were dramatic with the arrangements of 'Starfighter' lilies, 'Skyline' mini carnations, 'Himalaya' Alstroemeria, Aspidistra leaves, and bear grass, all designed by our members. All of the designs were beautiful and showed the creativity of the designers.

We were very pleased to have 27 members participate, of whom 17 were novice designers. This was a teaching program and also a lot of fun. It met one of the objectives of the National Garden Clubs—to educate our membership.

# **Beverley Hills Garden Club**

On April 22<sup>nd</sup> Beverley Hills Garden Club celebrated Earth Day by installing plants in their Alexandria Hospital garden. Located at the highly visible and busy visitor's entrance, the site is challenging. Earlier plantings were stressed and did not flourish. To help the effort the hospital installed an irrigation system and the landscape crew provided mulch.

Thanks to a Community Project Grant from the NCAGC Landscape Design Council, the garden was revamped utilizing native plants. BHGC Community Outreach Chair Libby Good carefully chose plants better suited to the northern exposure and challenging conditions. Plants included *Ilex glabra, Cephalanthus occidentalis, Heuchera, Aronia melancarpa, Asarum candense, Fothergilla, Polygonatum* and *Viburnum,* among others.





A crew of nine willing garden club members and our loyal photographer, Helga Abramson, descended on the site and blitzed the project. Executives from the hospital came out to applaud our efforts and provide bottled water.





On May 24<sup>th</sup>, five volunteers returned to the hospital to assist Libby in replacing the existing *Nandina* with native plants and filling in with more native plants.

As well as being beautiful, the garden will showcase native plants that are adapted to the local climate and soil conditions where they naturally occur. These important plant species provide nectar, pollen and seeds that serve as food for native butterflies, insects, birds and other animals.

Beverley Hills Garden Club is committed to the long-term maintenance of our garden by planting, fertilizing, pruning and amending the soil. Finances for garden maintenance are provided in our annual budget and work parties are regularly scheduled.

# The Garden Club of Lake Ridge

In March, The Garden Club of Lake Ridge hosted Thomas Bolles who gave a presentation to our group on B.E.S.T. Lawns (Building Environmentally Sustainable Turf). This is a Prince William County Virginia Cooperative Extension program which makes the best use of valuable resources and protects neighborhood streams, lakes, ponds and ultimately the Chesapeake Bay. It was a wonderful program which helped all of us learn so much about having a great lawn without ruining the environment.

Margaretta Danshaw brought a very interesting topic - Math in the Garden - to our April meeting. She introduced us to the Fibonacci Sequence, a numerical pattern named after the famous Italian mathematician. Margaretta demonstrated that lots of things in nature follow this pattern such as petals on a flower, the spiral of sunflower seeds or even the spiral of a snail shell. Also in April, some of our members enjoyed attending the Virginia Garden Week tours in Warrenton and Leesburg as well as seeing the Blue Bell Trail at Bull Run Regional Park.

In May, local bee keeper John Klapperrich brought his bees to our meeting and spent the evening explaining the art of raising bees and how our garden s and bees work together. Also in May, our Garden Club was treated to a wonderful tour of the Teaching Gardens at the Benedictine Monastery in Bristow, VA by member Wendy MacDonald who is also a Master Gardener.

Our June meeting was a Potted Plant Party where we enjoyed good food, wine and music while planting garden pots of beautiful plants to take home. This was our last meeting until September. It was a great way to end our

year.



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"MONTH-TO-MONTH PERENNIAL AND SHRUB MAINTENANCE CHART FOR THE MID-ATLANTIC REGION" is a distillation of vital gardening information, all in one place! This 44-page reference Chart is written for those of us who are passionate about our gardens and the plants we nurture. The Garden Maintenance Chart organizes, in an easy-to-use format, comprehensive information gardeners want and need in order to grow vigorous, beautiful perennials and shrubs in our Mid-Atlantic zones 6a to 7b.

With the 12 months running across the top of the Chart and the plant names (104 spectacular perennials and 65 shrubs) listed down the left-hand side, this Chart pulls together month-to-month information on when and how the plant should be pruned, information on whether the shrub blooms on new or old wood, when to divide, types and frequency of fertilizer, deadheading advice (and whether it produces secondary flowering).

Also included is designation of native plants--as well as pH preference, flowering time, winter interest, type of soil preference with moisture, light and zone ranges. The Chart contains plant-specific comments, a Key on each page, a cross-index of Latin and common plant names with pronunciation, the USDA Plant Hardiness Zone Map AND the new AHS Heat Zone Map with explanation.



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
